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
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Introduction

The National Youth Science Forum (NYSF) Year 12 Program gives students that are about to start Year 12 a broader understanding of study and career options available in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM).

Staying on campus at university colleges, students are immersed in science and technology. Participants:

- participate in tours of science and technology facilities,
- learn about cutting-edge research,
- · engage with industry partners and research providers,
- learn about university, training and STEM career pathways,
- mix with like-minded students their age from all over Australia,
- participate in social and team building activities, and
- network with former NYSF participants.

In January 2026, the NYSF Year 12 Program will run two summer sessions at:

Adjustment factors explained

If you're heading into your final high school exams this year and thinking about university, you've probably been browsing courses. You might have also have come across terms like "ATAR cutoff", "Selection Rank", and "adjustment factors".

But what do these mean, and how might they affect your chances of getting into your dream course? Don't stress - we'll explain everything you need to know about adjustment factors in this article. Let's get started.

Selection Rank vs ATAR

Your ATAR is a number that illustrates your overall academic performance when compared to everyone else in your year group across the whole country. It's simply a numerical value that universities use to easily see how your results compare to other Year 12 students.

So why do you sometimes see a minimum Selection Rank (SR) listed for a course instead of a minimum ATAR?

Well, each university is its own independent body, so they decide the minimum requirements for entry into their courses. And Selection Ranks are how they do this.

To calculate your SR, the university will take your ATAR (a set number that will never change), then add any adjustment factors - formerly called bonus points - that they think you're eligible for. The final total equals your Selection Rank.

To put it super simply, ATAR + adjustment factors = SR.

How to universities set Selection Ranks?

Each year, universities set the minimum SR for each course based on a few key factors, such as:

- the number of places available (the quota),
- how many people apply, and/or
- the overall competitiveness of applicants.

Because of this, the minimum SR required for entry to a course can change from one year to the next. These thresholds aren't set in advance, so when you're researching courses, last year's minimum should only be used as a general guide, not a guarantee.

And if your ATAR is slightly lower than the published SR, don't fret - you could be eligible for adjustment factors that will make up the difference.

Adjustment factors: What are they?

Now let's talk adjustment factors. These are the little pots of gold, the points that are added to your ATAR which make up your selection rank.

Adjustment factors exist to make the playing field more equal, ensuring that students who are at a disadvantage or who go the extra mile during their studies are given the best chance of securing a spot in their chosen course.

There are lots of reasons you might receive adjustment factors, including:

- Performance in certain subjects
- Living in a rural or remote area
- Coming from a low-SES background
- Diversity
- Through schemes such as the <u>Educational Access Scheme</u> (EAS)
- Elite athletes and performers

Remember, these bonus points **don't actually change your final ATAR** - they are applied individually by different institutions, and are only taken into account during applications.

How do I access adjustment factors?

Some adjustment factors are added automatically when you submit an application, so you don't need to do a thing. Others require a separate application (such as EAS).

While one university might award you adjustment factors for certain things, another university might not.

As selection rank adjustments vary between institutions, and even between courses at the same university, it's always worth checking the specific criteria for each before applying. The most reliable place to get information is from the universities themselves, so check on the course requirement pages, contact future students, or attend open days or information sessions.

You can also check with QTAC about which adjustment factors will be applied automatically and which ones you'll need to apply for.

Job Spotlights

How to become a Publisher

Publishers plan and oversee the printing and distribution of written materials, including books, magazines, newspapers, and articles. They act as the bridge between writers and the public, making their work accessible and promoting it.

If you have a creative streak and eye for business, and you are persistent and an excellent communicator, then a career as a publisher could be worth exploring.

What skills do I need as a publisher?

- Good attention to detail
- Organised & efficient
- Great time management
- Excellent communicator
- Diplomatic & fair
- Great collaborator
- Digitally literate
- Adaptable & flexible

What does the job involve?

- Liaising with writers & editors
- Making final checks to works
- Negotiating contracts & deals
- Collaborating with designers & printers
- Preparing promotional materials
- Keeping track of timelines & budgets
- Organising & attend publicity events
- Managing relationships with vendors

What industries do publishers typically work in?

- Arts & Recreation Services
- Information Media & Telecommunications
- Professional, Scientific & Technical Services

What Career Cluster do publishers belong to?

Publishers are primarily <u>Linkers</u>, passionate about connecting books with readers. They essentially act as a "link" between the author and the reader - without a publisher, authors might struggle to have their work found, while readers might struggle to find books they love. They also use some skills from the <u>Coordinator</u> Cluster, particularly when it comes to managing schedules and budgets.

What kind of lifestyle can I expect?

As a publisher, you can expect most of your work to be done during regular business hours, but you might work some overtime to meet deadlines. Most publishers work full-time, but there are occasionally opportunities for part-time work too.

Most publishers earn an average wage over the course of their careers.

A lot of your work will be done indoors, either in an office environment or potentially even from home.

How to become a publisher

While formal qualifications aren't strictly necessary to work in publishing, they can boost your employability. Work experience and internships are both highly regarded, and are a great way to make connections for future potential job opportunities.

- Finish high school with a focus on English and Maths.
- Consider completing a relevant tertiary qualification, typically in communications or arts.
- If possible, undertake an internship with a publishing house. If not, find entry-level jobs and start building your practical experience and networks.
- Think about specialising in a particular area of publishing. There are many to choose from, including:
 - Advertising & Marketing
 - o Contracts & Rights
 - Design
 - o Distribution
 - Editing
 - o Production & Printing
 - Sales
- With enough experience, you might like to start your own publishing business.

What can I do right now to work towards this career?

If you're in high school and you'd like to find out if becoming a publisher is right for you, here are a few things you could do right now:

- Find work experience with a publishing firm or other creative business to get a feel for what the industry is like and make important future contacts.
- Do some research into the industry and think about which style of works you'd like to publish (e.g. fiction, non-fiction, magazines, etc.).
- Talk to a publisher to see what their job involves. If you don't know anyone, try to find videos or documentaries instead.
